How it works

- All primary school students in Australia are eligible.

- The winner will be chosen at random on March 6, 2025, and notified using the parent or teacher contact details provided.

Why zebras? Zebras represent rare diseases, such as primary immunodeficiency (PI). In medical school, doctors are taught to look for common illnesses first when someone is sick. They are told “when you hear hoofbeats, think of horses, not zebras.” But sometimes, doctors need to think about zebras too! For people with PI, being a zebra means having a condition that isn’t common, but it’s just as important for doctors to notice and understand.
